Steve grew up in Colorado Springs, moving from Dallas, TX in 1970. He graduated from Cheyenne Mountain High School in 1973 and received his B.A. from Southern Methodist University in Dallas in 1977.

After a stint working with the homeless and mentally ill in a church context in Houston, TX, he returned to graduate school to earn his Masters in Clinical Psychology from University of Colorado, Colorado Springs in 1987, and his Ph.D. in Clinical Psychology from the University of Kentucky in 1992. His postdoctoral internship year was spent at the Cincinnati VA Medical Center.

He has worked as a full-time licensed psychologist in VA Medical Centers in Louisville, KY and Iron Mountain, MI prior to returning to Colorado Springs with the VA in 1999, where he is now the Director of the Community-Based Substance Abuse Treatment Programs for the Southeastern region of the state. He and his staff work between Colorado Springs and Pueblo to assist veterans in overcoming substance abuse problems, offering a range of support from DUI Level II classes to a 4-week partial hospitalization program. He has also maintained or been associated with private psychology practices in Kentucky, Indiana, and Michigan, and now Colorado.

Most recently he has been involved in the establishment of residential settings for homeless and recovering persons through the creation of the Crawford House for veterans in 2002 and the Harbor House for homeless severe alcoholics in 2004.

He is married to Anne, a social worker for Evercare Hospice, and has three children: Nathaniel, Jonathan, and Emma.
